



The Creative's Grant Playbook

BONUS: Funding Sources for Creative Projects

Grant funding can be the difference between “someday” and “this year.” But the process rewards preparation, not spontaneity. Here are the 8 things experienced grantees know before they apply, paired with a directory of 20 national funders actively supporting creative work (see page 2).

1. GRANTS FUND WHAT'S NEXT

Funders support work that hasn't started yet. Many won't reimburse rent, retroactive expenses, or completed projects. Frame your ask around the next phase.

PRO TIP: If your project is partly underway, describe the next phase as its own discrete chapter.

3. A VAGUE BUDGET IS AN AUTO-REJECT

Reviewers want itemized line items with real numbers: artist fees, equipment, venue, insurance, marketing. “Miscellaneous” is a red flag.

PRO TIP: Include a “sources and uses” section listing every income stream, not just the grant you're applying to.

5. WORK SAMPLES BEAT RÉSUMÉS

Most panels judge fit from samples alone. Pick your strongest three minutes or three images, not your most recent. Cue videos to the exact start point.

PRO TIP: Match samples to the proposed project. Don't send a pop side-hustle for a chamber commission.

7. REPORTING IS A RELATIONSHIP

Funders talk. Strong final reports (photos, press, audience data, honest reflection on what didn't work) open doors to repeat funding and referrals.

PRO TIP: Track metrics from day one so reporting is assembly, not reconstruction.

2. TIMING IS A YEAR-LONG GAME

From deadline to award notification to first payment can run 6 to 12 months. Build grant cycles into your project plan from day one.

PRO TIP: Keep a calendar of major cycles and work backward eight weeks to start drafting.

4. A PROJECT STATEMENT WINS OR LOSES

Reviewers read hundreds of proposals. Specific, sensory language beats abstract artist-speak. Write a tight, 300-word description built around what someone will actually see, hear, or feel.

PRO TIP: Have a non-artist friend read it. If they can't picture the project after one read, rewrite.

6. LETTERS OF SUPPORT MATTER

A short, specific letter from someone who has actually worked with you matters more than a vague blurb from a famous name. Ask early, two weeks minimum.

PRO TIP: Send your supporter a bullet list of what you'd like them to say. Most appreciate the scaffolding.

8. ELIGIBILITY & FISCAL SPONSORSHIP

Most arts grants require 501(c)(3) status. If you're an individual or unincorporated collective, a fiscal sponsor lets you apply legally through a qualifying nonprofit.

PRO TIP: Identify your fiscal sponsor before you start. Reviewers often check the sponsorship letter first.
